She won gold in the 400M and 800M races and contributed to the victory of the female 4×100M house relay, adding to her already notable achievement of setting an 800M record in her S1 year.

How do you feel about your performance on Sports Day?

I feel like I performed quite poorly because I ran slower than I did the previous year, in part due to the heat. Lately, I've also been focusing on a 5k season ahead, so my training plan has been adjusted with the goal of winning in longer distances. But there's always next year, and I will make another bid for the records. I'm excited to race in the mixed S3/4 category!

What are some memorable highlights from your events?

During the 800M race, one of my competitors cut in front of me before the 100m mark and I was temporarily trapped on the edge of my lane. However, I managed to break to the innermost lane quickly and get to the front of the pack eventually.

Hugo Healy is a DP1 student in Raffles. He took part in 400M, 800M, and shot put, earning first place in shot put and runner-up positions in the 400M and 800M races.

What are some memorable highlights from your events?

The most memorable highlight was in the shot put. I'd felt rather sore coming to the event because of rugby so I was just hoping to beat last year's distance. I don't know if I describe it as lucky, but Benson, the probable favourite to win the event got hurt in the warm up throws. Making him withdraw from the competition allowed me to secure the first position in Shot Put, however I wasn't able to beat my previous score. This unexpected turn of events added an element of surprise and excitement to the competition.

What are the sentiments you have towards such an event?

It was disappointing and disheartening to miss out on multiple years of sports events due to the pandemic. Sports events like Sports Day often serve as a highlight of the school year, fostering a sense of community, healthy competition, and school spirit. The absence left a sense of longing and a feeling of missed opportunities. Some of the students felt they missed the chance to showcase their skills, compete with their peers, and leave a lasting impact on the school's sports legacy.

I think the most thrilling events were the 100M sprint and the mixed relay. A delayed reaction time cost me third place but I had fun as I had a tight finish with my friend. The mixed relay was incredibly exciting as our opponents were fast, and we had an S3 girl move up to do the DP relay (credits to Chloe; she was amazing).

What are your thoughts on representing your house on Sports Day, especially given your role as the Said Head of House?

I feel incredibly proud to be able to represent my house for Sports Day and contribute to the win. As Head of Houses, Valerie and I both agreed that this could be one of our greatest achievements, as not only did we break the fourth place streak, we came back and took first. Embrace challenges, learn from failures, and see setbacks as opportunities for growth. Lastly, alongside training, take care of your body and mind. Success in sports is not just about physical training but also about maintaining overall well-being. Prioritise your rest, recovery, proper nutrition, and mental well-being.

U14 Boys' Badminton Team Triumphs Over CDNIS and HKIS

On February 27, our U14 boys badminton team played two matches at Canadian International School. After dominating CDNIS 3-0, our team faced Hong Kong International School (HKIS) in a tightly-contested game.

Austin Sun from S2-3 played the first singles, losing narrowly at 22-20. Our doubles team remained strong however, with Jason Ke from S2-3 and Olson Hong from S2-2 taking the game 21-14. Ryan Dermawan from S2-4 then dominated his singles match using strategic play, winning 21-12, while Sunay Chichula and Leon Huang from S2-5 clinched the second doubles 21-13 with seamless teamwork, securing an overall 3-1 triumph for the Lions. The back-to-back wins against CDNIS and HKIS moved our team's ranking up to third place in the ISSFHK League, putting them in a strong position for the playoffs. The team's spirit remains high as they look to continue their impressive run.

For more insights, we interviewed Mr. Ricky Green, teacher-in-charge of the U14 Boys Badminton Team:

What are your main goals for the team this season?

This season is about developing team culture so the players feel part of the team. We also want players to develop their fundamental shots and the quality of those shots. I want players to develop strategies and have the ability to problem solve during the match so they can change strategy when things are not going well. Lastly, I want to create Doubles teams that communicate effectively.

What are your comments on the team's performance so far?

The team is currently sitting in 3rd position in the ISSFHK league. We have won 3 and lost 2 matches. I feel that if the players can build momentum and develop a winning attitude, they can make the play-offs after the 10 matches are complete. They have the ability, but they will need to execute their shots and strategies at key moments in each upcoming match.

Mr. Samson Chen: We would like to organise events that are 'low threshold, high ceiling'. We hope everyone can participate if they want to, but we also provide a platform for students to showcase their talents. We have organised the S1 maths mentoring programme and the AMC8 training programme. Some DP students have been engaged in the two events. They generously share their ideas and experience in studying mathematics and competitions. Also, Math Cube students prepared interactive maths games for the STEM Week and the Family Fiesta. We aimed to arouse students' interest and show the connection between mathematics and real life through these activities.

Leo Liu and Kris Wang: For those who might find maths challenging, we as the Math Cube would like to encourage them to understand and integrate the mathematical context by heart instead of just memorising the formulas. As for those who excel in maths, we would like to provide a chance for them to extend their knowledge, and create a mathematic atmosphere where we discuss the more challenging maths questions. To learn maths, it is vital to not fear it. Think of any complex questions. Now try to break it down into small steps. After all, you realise what you are doing is just simple addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. As a general note, we hope to enlighten students to enjoy maths.
